

AIRSHIP INVENTOR SET FREE.

German Court Decides that Hermann Ganswindt Acted in Good Faith.

BERLIN, June 12.—Hermann Ganswindt, the airship inventor, who was arrested last April on the charge of deception and forgery and gulling the public into subscribing for shares of an aeroplane company, was given his freedom to-day. It was found when Ganswindt was arrested that among others he had forged the name of Duke Ernst Gunther of Schleswig-Holstein, Emperor William's brother-in-law.

The experts selected by the court to examine the models of Herr Ganswindt's airship have decided that the inventor was probably acting in good faith, and that there is sufficient merit in his contrivances to disprove the charge of conscious swindling. The case against him was dismissed.
